Outstanding Faculty Activities and Accomplishments

College of Sciences and Mathematics

Dr. Kimberly Childs, Dean

Dr. Daniel Bennett (Assistant Professor, Department of Biology) was awarded a grant through the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality for his research project titled *Bees of the Big Thicket National Preserve*.

Dr. Michele Harris (Department of Chemistry and Biochemistry), recent recipient of an endowed professorship, has developed the first course specific to the new Patent Education program. The course is titled Introduction to Intellectual Property and is open to all STEM majors as well as Forestry, Environmental Science and Agriculture majors. He also published two poems in *Watching the Perseids: The Backwaters Press Twentieth Anniversary Anthology*. **Dr. Kyle Conlon** *Assistant professor of psychology*, Conlon's article "Transparency for the Public Good: When Feeling Powerful Does and Does Not Affect Willingness to Sacrifice for the Environment" was recently accepted for publication in The Journal of General Psychology.

Arthur Temple College of Forestry and Agriculture

Dr. Jared Barnes, assistant professor of agriculture, received the 2017 Sustainability Award from the Keep Nacogdoches Beautiful organization during SFA's Earth Day Celebration held April 1.

SFA's Division of Environmental Science was invited to participate in the Society of Petroleum Engineer's student competition at the Health, Safety, Security, Environment, and Social Responsibility Conference - North America in New Orleans on April 18-20. Six universities participated in a challenging four-hour quiz bowl competition sponsored by ExxonMobil. It was SFA's first time to compete in the event, which was dominated by petroleum and environmental engineering programs.

SFA placed fourth behind Colorado School of Mines (first place), University of Oklahoma (second place), Texas Tech University (third place) – and ahead of Oklahoma State University (fifth place) and Louisiana State University (sixth place). It was a close finish and significantly raised the visibility of SFA's program with the petroleum industry. Five senior environmental science students represented SFA: Brianna Bueno, Conner Marx, Jill Pickett, Craig Sterling, and Megan McCombs. Coaches were **Drs. Sheryll Jerez, Kenneth Farrish,** and **Jeremy Higgins**. The teams competed in three topic areas: Environment, Social Responsibility, and Health and Safety. We plan on participating again in two years when the event is held in Houston. **Drs. Christopher Comer** and **Daniel Scognamillo** led 25 students from the forestry program to the Texas Chapter of the Wildlife Society Meeting in San Antonio, TX.

Led by college advisors, **Brandy Bishop** and **Kara Goodson**, over 20 potential employers participated in the first-ever ATCOFA Career Fair held in the forestry building; 120 students participated in the event.

Drs. Daniel Unger and David Kulhavy representing the geospatial science program were recently invited by the Society of American Foresters to write a paper on their leading use of UAVs in forest management applications.

Linda Reynolds, director of the East Texas Research Center (ETRC)

- The ETRC hosted a reception in January for the opening of the David Rusk papers donated by Linda Rusk and family. Kyle Ainsworth, Special Collections Librarian, was the principal in processing the Rusk collection which comprises more than 700 items covering the Republic of Texas and early Texas statehood.
- Ms. Reynolds was appointed to serve a three-year term on the Texas Historical Records Advisory Board whose mission is to:
 - ✓ promote awareness of historically significant records through education and
 - ✓ training support public access to records;
 - ✓ serve as a catalyst for improving storage conditions within the state;
 - support the preservation efforts of historical and genealogical societies, archives, museums, libraries, colleges, local governments, and other institutions;
 - ✓ review grant requests submitted to the National Historical Publications and Records Commission (NHPRC) for funding.

- Ms. Reynolds presented at the Texas Czech Genealogical Society "Preservation and Disaster Planning & Recovery of your Family Treasures" January 28, 2017
- Ms. Reynolds is overseeing the project process the W.T. Carter & Bro. Lumber Company records. Several graduate and undergraduate students are involving with processing the extensive collection. This is anticipated to be a two-year project.
- Ms. Reynolds was awarded a \$12,674 Texas Treasures grant from the Texas State Library & Archives Commission to digitize 384 oral histories gathered during the 1970s-1990's from Gary High School students as part of the Loblolly magazine. Linda is providing a unique oral history (OH) number prior to uploading them to Sound Cloud and ingesting them into the East Texas Digital Archives online repository.
- Ms. Reynolds served as a reviewer for the Academy of Certified Archivist (ACA) recertification petitions, Feb

• Edward Iglesias, Web Services Librarian and Kreg Mosier, head of Library Web Services, launched the Emerging Technologies Area in the Steen Library, which is a hub of tools provided for student use to facilitate their literacy and mastery of emerging technologies. Currently, the focus is on Virtual Reality (VR) and 3D printing as aids to visualizing and rapidly prototyping ideas. In the use of these tools students are exposed to 3D Modeling software in a VR environment such as Tiltbrush and Medium as well as more conventional desktop tools like Autodesk 360 Fusion or Revit. The immersive nature of Virtual Reality also allows for a wide variety of educational application in many fields of study. By "getting out of the way" of student learning, the Library hopes to provide an environment where students are constantly challenging themselves while working with peers to research, discover and create.
