HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE DEAN

The College of Education has experienced many successes this year. Successes highlighted by the Dean are:

- COE created a new vision and mission, articulated our values and established the goals that will guide us in the coming years.
- We opened our new Human Services Building that contains classrooms with the latest technology, excellent research facilities and clinics, and a very professional working environment.
- The Audiology Clinic received a \$50,000 donation and was named after Ed and Gwen Cole.
- We continued the development of online courses and programs. (We now offer approximately 80 percent of all SFA Web-based courses).
- Our Livestock and Equestrian Center is finally under construction, and it will become home to our SFA Women's Equestrian Team and SFA Rodeo Team .
- A new Athletic Training facility and master's degree program was approved. The facility is under construction.
- Our College Council developed an online course evaluation system that will provide a summary of responses for immediate feedback to faculty and will help us determine if courses are meeting established competencies.
- Our overall pass rate on TExES/ExCET jumped from 94 percent to 99 percent for all who took educator certification state exams.
- We remain fully accredited by NCATE and all academic programs in the college are accredited by national accreditation bodies.
- A partnership with the Hayter Trust has resulted in the renovation of a beautiful old home into a restaurant that will serve as a training site for our hospitality administration students beginning next fall.
- We selected and have begun implementing a college-wide Web-based system for student electronic portfolios which will help verify that students have gained the knowledge and skills for their discipline area.
- Enrollment continues to increase in the College of Education. In comparing Fall 2002 with 2003, COE semester credit hours generated are up 8 percent and headcount is up 3.1 percent. We currently have 3,443 majors, a number which represents 31 percent of SFA enrollment.
- Plans are under way to seek legislative funding for an East Texas Early Childhood Research Center (which will include a renovation of the Human Sciences North Building) that is projected to become a two-section per grade charter school. Renovations will include construction of a new cafeteria for the Charter School, Lab Schools and Human Science programs; and renovation of the Early Childhood Lab School. The Research Center will provide outreach programs and support to community agencies and school districts.
- SFA is working on legislation that would fund a hatchery and breeder facility for our Poultry Science Program.
- Community college collaborations have been strengthened and expanded.
- We continue to write and receive grants that fund our various outreach projects and research.

Initiatives, Awards and Achievements:

- 2003-2004 educational programs in Mast Arboretum and Pineywoods Native Plant Center educated 16,248 individuals under the direction of Elyce Rodewald, educational coordinator for the Mast Arboretum.
- Andrew King, horticulture major, was high-scoring individual in the Southern Region Judging Contest of the American Society for Horticultural Science.
- The Arboretum Plant Sale raised \$65,000 in 2003.
- Women's SFA Equestrian Team had another successful season ending with an alumnus, Karen Hodges, placing third in the National Intercollegiate Horse Show.
- Approximately 2,500 FFA members came to campus for leadership events.
- We have completed the first successful year with SFA and Tyler Junior College ApacheJacks Program.
- Agri-Ambassadors continued recruiting efforts with several trips to area high schools, community colleges, Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo and State FFA Convention.
- Had first successful year at the SFA Broiler Research Center.
- The monthly SFA Mast Arboretum Les Reeves Guest Lecture Series once again received tremendous support and attendance.
- The Regional Soil Testing Laboratory analyzed approximately 6,500 soil, forage and water samples for customers this past year.

Initiatives, Awards and Achievements:

- Started teaching classes in our new building March 29, and the building was dedicated April 20.
- Provided more than 3,200 hours of speech-language therapy, 200 hours of speech-language diagnostics, 300 hearing screenings, and 165 audiological sessions
- Counseling clinic provided about 18,000 hours of community counseling
- Rehabilitation Services Program helped place 1,500 adults in employment in conjunction with the Treatment Center Job Club.

- The new building provides state of the art clinics for audiology, speech therapy, and counseling, as well as a Human Neuroscience Lab that will allow the study of human brain and behavior. Classrooms feature the latest technology including podiums with data projectors, computers connected to the Web, Elmo document cameras and VCRs.
- Faculty have current grants funded in the amount of \$4,249,418.
- More than 500 students took sign language this year.
- Special Education Basic Skills Clinic served 45 children with reading and math instruction.
- The Vision/O&M's Distance Learning Program taught more than 70 students via interactive video and Internet from Texas, Washington, Montana, Wyoming and Idaho.
- Current scholarships from grants total \$556,250.
- This year faculty submitted five grants for a total of \$2.34 million with four still pending and one approved for \$500,000.
- Five faculty served on the U.S. Department of Education grant proposal review panels.
- Numerous peer reviewed publications and presentations at national conferences as seen in the section on publications.
- Robin Rumph served as past-president of the Texas Association for Behavior Analysis.
- Mike McKaig served as editor of *TEJAS, The Texas Journal of Audiology and Speech Pathology*.

Initiatives, Awards and Achievements:

- The principal preparation program faculty participated in a program review process with the Lighthouse Initiative, a statewide evaluation process for the improvement of educational leadership preparation in the state.
- A practitioner advisory group was implemented for the principal preparation program.
- Six additional faculty members participated in WebCT training and in the development of Web-enhanced and online courses.
- A pilot online principal preparation program and superintendent certification program was implemented in Galena Park.
- Through recruitment efforts by faculty members, enrollment increased in the principal preparation program.

- Improvements to the departmental Web site were made to help students access information about the department.
- Two doctoral newsletters were published.
- *Scholar-Practitioner Leader and Teacher Education and Practice*, two educational journals, were published by faculty members.
- Faculty members presented internationally, nationally, regionally and statewide.
- Nine doctoral students graduated.
- A new cohort of students was selected for the doctoral program.
- Doctoral students and faculty members presented at the Southwest Educational Research Association.
- The Gaining Early Awareness and Readiness for Undergraduate Programs (GEAR UP) grant proposal was funded for a fifth year.
- The First Annual E.J. Campbell Institute was held in cooperation with Phi Delta Kappa.
- The First Annual School Law Conference was held.
- The department received an Institutional Research Grant to extensively evaluate our programs.
- The department hosted the Texas Association of School Boards Spring School Board Workshop.
- Faculty members served as sponsors for Kappa Delta Phi.
- Faculty presented papers at the American Educational Research Association, Southwest Educational Research Association, American Association of School Administrators, Phi Delta Kappa National Conference, the University Council of Educational Administration, and National Council of Professors of Educational Administration.

- Supervised 44 post-baccalaureate teaching interns in 35 partnership schools.
- Maintained up-to-date Teacher Education database containing over 4,000 individual records.
- Upgraded the Educational Media Center, adding 25 Dell computer workstations for ELE 304 Technology in Teaching classes, three G5 Macintosh computers for digital media production, and expanding Learning Plus stations for use in College Reading classes and for SED 372 Reading and Information Literacy in Secondary Schools. Offered laminating and copying services.

All Stephen F. Austin State University educator preparation programs continue to be accredited by the state. The overall initial pass rate for individuals completing a certification program during 2002-2003 is 98 percent with the each of the seven demographic groups' pass rates at 95 percent or higher.

Ninety-eight percent of Stephen F. Austin State University students seeking initial teacher certification during 2002-2003 passed **all** state-required assessments in basic skills, professional knowledge/pedagogy, academic content area and or teaching special populations.

Initiatives, Awards and Achievements:

- Approved and processed 1,725 TExES/ExCET, TExMAT, TASC and TOPT registrations for 11 testing sessions.
- Provided 33 department chairs and content area advisers in 20 departments, campus-wide, with testing data before and after each testing session.
- Worked with four academic departments individually to align their curriculum with the new educator standards.
- Presented statistical analysis of test data for the past two years to COE departments for use in their NCATE assessment plans and for future programmatic decisions.
- Conducted pilot testing in Health Science, All-Level Music, and All-Level Physical Education for the National Evaluation Systems, Inc.
- Conducted pilot testing in Family and Consumer Sciences for the American Association of Family and Consumer Sciences.
- Administered four mastery tests for an academic department outside the COE.
- Coordinated new computer-administered testing for EC-4 Pedagogy and Professional Responsibilities and EC-4 Generalist.
- Purchased representative forms for two more TExES tests which were given to the appropriate departments.
- Visited classes each semester to provide current information on testing for certification.
- Maintained a comprehensive up-to-date COE credential testing Web site.

FACILITIES UPDATE



The College of Education is the largest of the seven colleges in the university. Ten major buildings, athletic fields, two farms and 11 field sites provide facilities for instruction. Outreach facilities include an arboretum, center for educational partnerships, community counseling center, early childhood laboratory, center for economic education, educational research center, feed research center, learning center, Stanley Speech and Hearing Clinic, soils testing laboratory, two farms and a charter school.

Human Services Building Dedicated April 20, 2004

The university's newest facility, the Human Services building, began serving the College of Education on March 29 and was formally dedicated on April 20, 2004. This three-story, 60,000-square-foot facility will house numerous programs within the Human Services School including Deaf Education/ASL, Counseling, Neurology Rehabilitation, Special Education, Communication Disorders, School Psychology and Visual Impairments. In addition, an audiology lab and clinic suite will serve the community through outreach programs. Approximately 8,000 square feet of the building houses the modernized and extended telephone switch and Web interface servers for the university.
