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## 1. Two unique programs

Thank you for your interest in pursuing a graduate degree in education at Stephen F. Austin State University (SFASU). We offer several exciting and innovative graduate programs that prepare teachers for careers in the secondary school setting. By exploring the roles of teacher as researcher, scholar-practitioner, student-advocate, and community member, our Master's Programs cultivate a learning community of faculty and students through dialogue and critical inquiry.

While graduate programs can be designed to meet students' individual needs, most students choose one of the following three degree plans:

### Master of Arts in Teaching (MAT) with Teacher Certification

This 30-hour program is designed for students who have earned an undergraduate degree but are **not certified to teach**. In addition to courses that explore educational research, curriculum, and instructional design, students receive certification through a certification sequence. The first 18 hours includes coursework that prepares you to become certified in the state of Texas. The remaining 12 hours includes coursework that will further your knowledge and skills and help you improve your classroom practice.

Coursework for the MAT program is fully online.

In addition to completing the 30 graduate hours, you must either:

- a. secure a full-time, paid teaching position (SED 541/542) during which you will be supervised by a field supervisor from SFA OR
- b. complete the traditional clinical teaching semester (SED 544), often called "student teaching," during which you will work alongside a certified practicing teacher and will also be supervised by a field supervisor from SFA. The student teaching semester is not a paid position.

### Master of Education (M.Ed.) Degrees

#### I. Master of Education (M.Ed.) in Teaching and Learning (36 hr.)

This program is designed primarily for experienced teachers who wish to further their education and improve their teaching practice or for teachers who wish to qualify for leadership positions within their schools or districts (i.e., curriculum/instructional specialist).

Students in this program will all take an 18-hour core, which will provide them with the knowledge and skills to better serve the needs of the diverse EC-12 student population in Texas. Beyond the core, students will choose from three tracks (i.e., ESL/Bilingual, Online Teaching, and Gifted/Talented) in which to specialize and will be able to choose 6 hours of

electives from inside or outside the College of Education to further expand their knowledge base.

Students in this degree program will complete a capstone project in conjunction with a 3-hour graduate course (SED 595).

## II. Master of Education (M.Ed.) with Content Area Minor (18/18)

This 36 hour program includes 18 hours in secondary education (SED) and 18 hours in the student's chosen teaching field. The degree is aimed at students that wish to teach at a community college and/or for high school teachers who wish to teach dual credit courses. Other important details about this degree plan:

- This degree cannot be done in conjunction with the teacher certification sequence. They are two separate degrees.
- You must take 18 hours of 500-level coursework in a second content area. All 18 hours must come from the same secondary content area. For example, you cannot take 6 hours from three different content areas.
- Students in this degree program will complete a capstone project in conjunction with a 3-hour graduate course (SED 595).

## 2. Admission Process

### MAT Program

#### Admission Requirements:

- Completed Bachelor's degree from an accredited university
- Minimum cumulative grade-point average of 2.75 or higher on the last 60 hours of undergraduate coursework (on a 4.0 scale)
- Passing score on the PACT (see below)
- The GRE is not required

If you are interested in applying to this program, please follow these steps:

- 1) Please be sure to verify that Stephen F. Austin State University is approved by TEA to issue a certification in the content area that you are seeking. The content areas in which you can become certified via this program are listed [here](#).
- 2) Apply online to the [Graduate School](#). *Make sure to choose Master of Arts in Teaching (MAT) as the degree you seek—**not** Master of Education (M.Ed.) in Secondary Education.* There will be a \$50.00 application fee charged to your account at SFASU. The Graduate School will calculate your GPA to determine eligibility.
- 3) You will have to submit official transcripts to the graduate school as part of the admissions process.

- 4) Take and receive acceptable scores reports on the Pre-Admission Content Test (PACT). As the applicant, you are responsible for registering and taking the PACT test on your own. You can get more information about the test here:

You MUST pass the PACT before you can be admitted into the MAT program. There are no exceptions to this rule. Submit your PACT scores to [edcert@sfasu.edu](mailto:edcert@sfasu.edu).
- 5) Participate in an admissions interview with a faculty member. This will be done virtually rather than in-person.
- 6) Receive an acceptance or denial form and degree plan from the corresponding department.
- 7) If you are accepted, the Certification Office will be notified and you will be entered into the Teacher Education Program. There will be a \$100.00 application fee charged to your account at SFASU.
- 8) After you are admitted into the Teacher Education Program, you will receive a letter stating your eligibility for the one-year teaching internship on a Probationary Certificate. We encourage you to copy this letter and submit it with job applications and present it at job interviews.
- 9) Please remember that a Texas Standard Teaching Certificate requires individuals to complete the required coursework, required state exams, and a field experience. After you complete the Texas Standard Teaching Certificate, you will have the option to continue coursework in your program area to complete the MAT degree.

If you completed the PBIC program and then took off from coursework to teach or to pursue some other endeavor, you will have to re-apply. Be sure to choose Master of Arts in Teaching (MAT) (NOT MEd) in Secondary Education as the degree you seek.

## M.Ed. Programs

### Admission Requirements:

- Completed Bachelor's degree from an accredited university
- Minimum cumulative grade-point average of 2.5 and a grade-point average of 2.8 on the last 60 hours of undergraduate coursework (on a 4.0 scale)
- The GRE is not required

If you are interested in applying to this program, please follow these steps:

- 1) Apply online to the [Graduate School](#). There will be a \$50.00 application fee charged to your account at SFASU. The Graduate School will calculate your GPA to determine eligibility.
- 2) Choose Master of Education in Teaching and Learning if you want to complete the degree with the specializations/tracks. Choose Master of Education in Secondary Education if you want to complete the 18/18 degree.
- 3) Receive an acceptance or denial form and degree plan from the corresponding department.

## Additional Admissions Issues:

### Application Deadlines

For a Fall semester start: August 20; MAT up to the week before the semester begins

For a Spring semester start: November 30

For a Summer start: April 30

### Admission Status

You can be admitted in two different ways:

1. Clear – this means you have no conditions imposed on your admission; this is the admission status you want.
2. Probationary – You may be admitted on a probationary basis if your GPA is below the minimum. In this case, you have one semester to bring your GPA up or else you will not be allowed to continue taking classes. Being admitted on a probationary basis may keep you from receiving financial aid. ### Transfer credit

If you have taken graduate courses at another university, you may be able to transfer those credits to your degree plan at SFASU. Please order an official transcript and have it sent to the Graduate School. In addition, please send copies (unofficial is okay) to Dr. Olson Beal at [olsonbehk@sfasu.edu](mailto:olsonbehk@sfasu.edu) for evaluation.

### Completion timeline

You have six years to complete your graduate program. Courses that were taken more than six years prior will not count towards your degree plan. Please plan accordingly so that you can graduate within the six year window.

**5. Registration & Advising Procedures**

You will be assigned an advisor when you enroll in the program. The advisor will contact you each semester for advising.

Once the course schedule for an upcoming semester becomes available, you have been advised, and you have acknowledged your advising, you log in and register yourself for the courses you need. For summer and fall semesters, the course schedule typically becomes

available in April. For spring semester, the course schedule typically becomes available in November. Please register as soon as you can so that we can plan appropriately.

## 6. Certification Testing Procedures

***Certify Teacher Exam:*** You must pass the Certify Teacher PPR exam during SED 543 before the College of Education clears you to take the actual PPR certification test. No fees are required; students will be provided with a login after the course begins. A student who does not achieve the minimum required score will be given a grade of WH in the course until agreed upon requirements are completed.

A student who does not make the minimum required score will be required to work independently with the SED 543 instructor. At this time, the student will receive a WH in the course. A student who does not pass on that attempt must complete one or more of the following options:

1. Repeat SED 453 with instructor and department chair approval.
2. Attend a paid, appropriate professional review session approved by the instructor and department chair.
3. Demonstrate readiness to test on the next regularly scheduled Mastery Exam.
4. Other, as determined by the SED 543 instructor and the department chair.

## 7. Practicum / Field-based Requirements

MAT Field-Based Experiences (required by the state of Texas: see [TAC 228.35](#)):

- SED 527 students must complete 30 hours of observations during this course: 15 face to face and 15 virtual/online/video. This is a requirement for teacher certification in Texas.
- SED 591-SED 592: You must be teaching in a classroom in a public, accredited K-12 Texas school in order to complete the work associated with this course sequence.
