Dear Mrs. Keefe:

In reply to your letter of September lo asking if the First Presbyterian Church of Marshall was the first Presbyterian church organized in this area, I will give you the facts as set forth in the history of this church which was published as a part of its Centennial Celebration in May of 1950:

l st congregation organized in January 1845. This was a small group which did not survive.

2 nd congregation organized in May 1850 at Wyalucing, the home of B. L. Holcombe. Among the members of this congregation were the famous Lucy Holcombe and her sister Anna who married Brig. Gen. Elkanah Greer; and after the war Brig. Gen. M. D. Ector was an active member in the church.

In 1852 a frame church was built
In 1884 the old church was sold and the present building was erected.

From other sources I find that the Cumberland Presbyterian Church of Marshall (an entirely different denomination from the First Presbyterian) was established in April of 1848. I do not know when its original church building was constructed. It is no longer in existence and the present building is of a fairly recent date.

The Harrison County Historical Survey Committee approved the application for a Medallion for the First Presbyterian Church because of its architectural interest, its cultural influence in the community, and the prominent persons who were members of its early congregation.

Along this same line I would like to get a statement from the State Committee which awards Medallions in regard to its present policy in awarding Medallions to homes. Harrison County has some of the most notable examples in the state of early homes -- from an architectural point of view. The families who built them were prominent in County affairs, but no person or event of statewide historical importance is connected with the house.

Eight Medallions have thus far been awarded to houses in Harrison County. Four of these were to homes whose only claim to distinction are age and architectural interest. There are at least six more worthy of a Medallion for the same reasons. It $w^{\prime\prime\prime}$ be very awkward if our County Survey Committee urges and secures applications from the owners for Medallions only to have them turned down by the State House Committee.

Is it now required that some historical personage or event be associated with a house before it is eligible for a Medallion ? We will hold up our Medallion program until this matter is clarified.

Dear Mrs. Patterson:

Mrs. Keefe has asked me to answer your letter of September 22 regarding Medallion possibilities.

The application for the First Presbyterian Church was held up because we did not feel that enough history was presented on the first application, but the material you later supplied took care of this, and it has now been approved; you will be getting an official notice from the Austin office shortly.

The policy has not changed regarding awarding a Medallion to homes. This is still done on the basis of "structures of historical and cultural significance to the state and community in which it exists, therefore, meriting preservation." The test mentioned in your letter is one that is set forth for the new Texas Official Historical Markers and not Medallions; however, this same reasoning has been applied to Medallion applications where the structure itself, because of its age or some other reason, might not have qualified standing alone.

We have several people "flirting" with the idea of doing a comprehensive book on Medallion structures, and for that reason, we are requiring that adequate information be submitted with the application. I know that you can well understand the necessity for this.

I realize that a number of our committees have been embarrassed when they have gone to the time, trouble and expense of submitting an application and having it turned down. I don't know of any way that we can completely cure this. We are required by law to take this state action, but I think that we can do this—i.e.—you could write us a letter about these various structures and furnish a picture if possible, and we can circulate the information to the committee and in turn give you an idea as to whether or not it would pass. . . . then you could go to the owner.

It must be borne in mind, too, that applications from your area (I still call it our area) are reviewed more rigidly, or I should say by a more severe standard, than those from the newer portions of the state. You have so many fine old buildings, and I know that you want to keep up the area standards just as we do.

Presbyterians To Receive Medallion

Presentation of a Texas Historical Survey Committee Medallion is to be made at the evening service at the First Presbyterian Church on Sunday. The presentation is one of several phases of the observance of Texas Civil War History Appreciation Week to be noted from April 21, San Jacinto Day, through April 26.

The Medallion, later to be attached to an outer wall of the church, will be presented in a brief ceremony at which the Rev. William Henry Benchoff, minister will preside. Col. Chesley Adams, president of the Harrison County Historical Society will make the presentation to Miss Rebecca Cameron, named by the Session of the church to receive the Medallion for the congregation, as a member of the church and the historical society, a Sunday School teacher and chairman of the Business Women's group.

The church, established in 1850, has had an active part in community life throughout its 114 years since organization, and has occupied the present structure since May 1884.

The Rev. Mr. Benchoff will preach at both morning and evening services. At the morning service there is to be a solo by Miss Myra Jo Putman and at the evening service the Men's Quartet, composed of Frank Long, Bushe Morgan, E. T. Morley and W. J. Sedberry, will present the special music. Edwin Johnson will be at the organ.
