WHAT IS IT? WHY USE IT?

- **WHAT:** Students writing or making notes on slides or presentations, individually or collaboratively
- **WHY:** Engages students, gives them ownership of material, allows you to catch misunderstandings
 - Allows students to give context to slides

WHEN AND HOW TO USE IT?

- **WHEN:** Whenever you want
 - Examples: To see what they already know, to review concepts covered in class, to liven a sluggish class
- **HOW:** Zoom or Jamboards for online/Livestream, With the Whiteboard in a F2F
 - Zoom annotation does NOT work on a Chromebook- Jamboard is a good alternative
 - Use Markers and Whiteboard to write over projected slides


