DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Albert M. Arnot house at 306 W. Houston St. in Marshall, Texas, was built in 1848. It is a raised, one story house with a full basement, of frame construction and load bearing brick. Almost square in plan, the detached house is situated on a lot measuring 70° by 120°. A five bay porch with square columns forms the front elevation with entry to the "central hall plan" house through double doors. Brick laid in a common bond, with every sixth course as headers, forms the basement level, and clapboard siding is the exterior material for the story above. The front porch is accommodated within the gabled roof of the house. The only change in the pitch occurs at the rear additions.

The porch across the front is articulated with stout square columns, placing the house in the early phase of Greek Revival, which its date of 1848 confirms. Simple, lightly-scaled horizontals and simple square ballusters comprise the balustrade. Classically detailed capitals atop the square columns carry a deep cornice which does not wrap around the sides of the porch.

Windows located on the front elevation are the classic Greek Revival 6 over 6 light double hung sash. Windows on the south and east elevations are 2 over 2 and 9 over 9 and are the result of additions or alterations. The original cypress shutters are present on the front elevation and are painted grey. The double front doors are wood, 4-panel doors. A seven light transom above the front doors extends across the heads of the 3-light sidelights.

"Shadows" apparent on photographs taken prior to the 1977 restoration indicate the earlier removal of exterior, end chimneys on the east and west elevations. Patches in the wood flooring indicate the earlier removal of two fireplaces in each of the front parlor rooms. There are reports of a third chimney, located on the east elevations, and a hearth located in the harness room in the basement.

Although sparten in its exterior appearance, the relative lack of decorative elements emphasizes the stark geometry of the house and gives the house great distinction.

The main floor of the house was originally four rooms with full width front and rear porches. Floors are random width pine two inches thick. The 12' ceiling height easily accommodates the 7 1/2' high doors. Hand planed board and batten ceilings (1" x 12" boards with 1" x 6" battens spaced 10" apart) are present throughout the house; those of the front porch, hall, and two front rooms are more ornate and elaborated with grooved and beveled battens. The plain interior wood trim is painted. The interior doors are 4-paneled (the panel is raised on one side and recessed on the other), painted, and are complete with original box locks, porcelain knobs and hinges. Stained pine interior shutters are used throughout. Structural timbers are knot-free heart pine; hand hewn sills and beams are mortised and pegged. Interior wall studs are 4 x 4's sheathed with rough sawn 1 x 12's and wallpaper. In the 1977 restoration thin plywood was placed over the rough 1 x 12's before the wallpaper was hung. The stairs located in the central hall lead to the basement and are unusually refined for the early date of the house. The ballusters are walnut spindles, probably brought from New Orleans, and the hand rail is mahogany.

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Arnot house at 306 W. Houston St., built in 1848, presents an excellent example of early Greek Revival style architecture in Marshall, Texas. Located within the city's oldest residential area, just off the courthouse square, the structure is one of the oldest remaining houses in Marshall. Virtually contiguous to the main downtown commercial area of Marshall, the house has almost continuously housed tradesman or professionals who operated their business enterprises on the premises.

Architecturally, the house is a classic Creole, or Louisiana raided-cottage, rendered in the Greek Revival style. The basement or ground floor is completely above ground with the main floor at the second level.

Lucinda and Albert M. Armot were early settlers of the community, arriving in Marshall in 1845 from Mississippi. He was one of the town's early blacksmiths and was apparently prosperous. Besides Armot, who located his blacksmith shop on the property, subsequent owners and their respective trades included: Francis Lang, a German cabinet maker (owner from 1857 to 1871); A. and Doris Bernstein, a prominent merchant (owner from 1871 to 1908); B. A. and Maggie Cargile - he was a farmer and for a short time, the sheriff (owner from 1908 to 1919); Joseph Black, Sr. and Lucille McCarty Black - he was an Irish cobbler (owner from 1919 to 1960); Joseph Black, Jr., a veterinarian (owner 1960 to 1977).

The house is currently owned by Allen and Ann Staggers who have restored the exterior and interior appearance. Today the house is in excellent condition. Presently accommodating professional offices, the house continues its tradition of being involved in the commercial enterprise of Marshall.


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The ground floor consists of three rooms that apparently had dirt or brick floors. The walls are of solid hand-made brick commonly referred to as "Marshall Brown" brick. Brick columns support the porches and the west side of the house.


There were originally three outbuildings: a kitchen that was from the Arnot occupancy, a bath house and an outhouse. These are no longer extant. A detached cobbler's shop built in 1919 by Joseph Black, Sr. was removed in 1977 from the front yeard. Following Mr. Black's death in 1955, the shop was rented to a barber.
