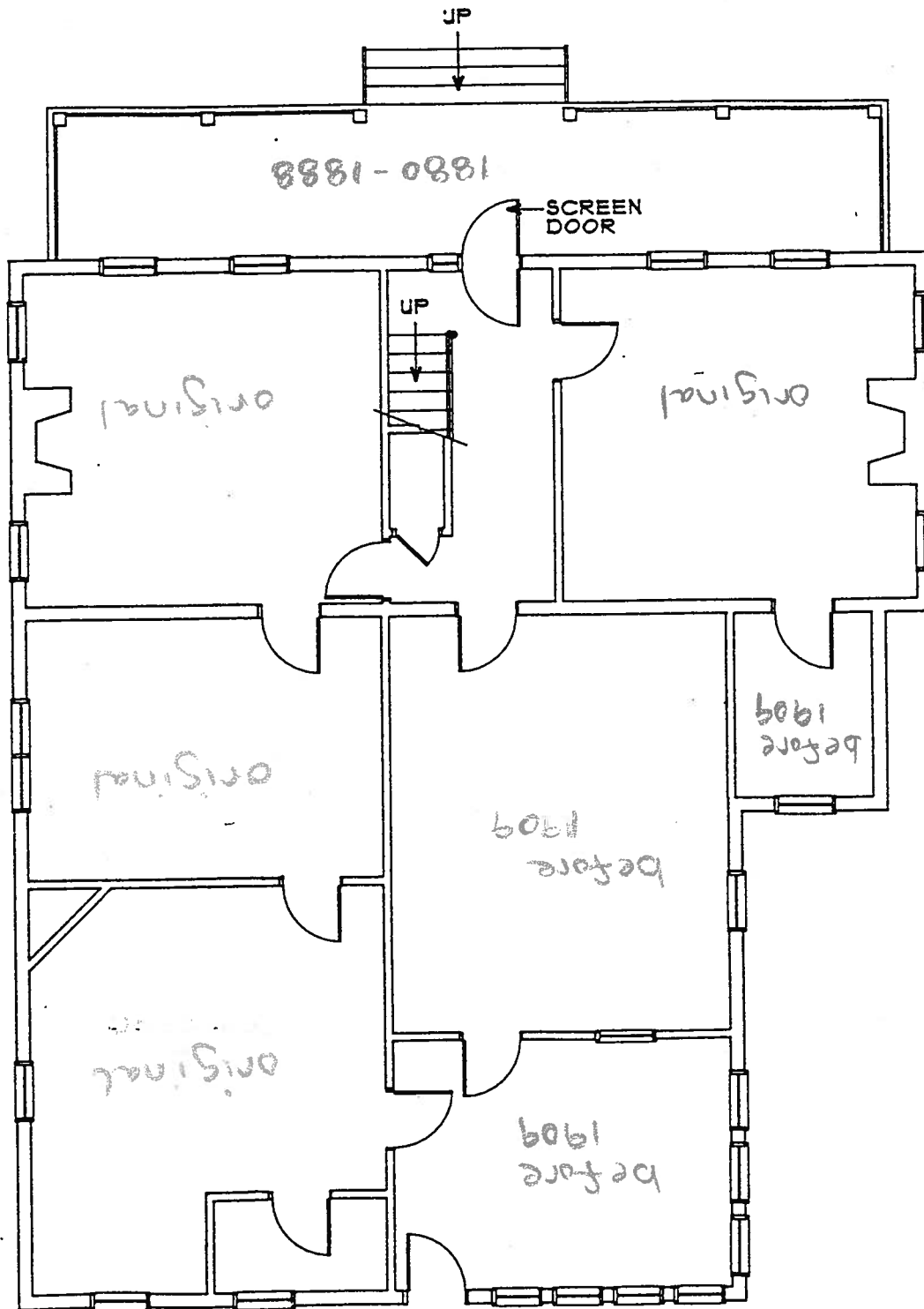

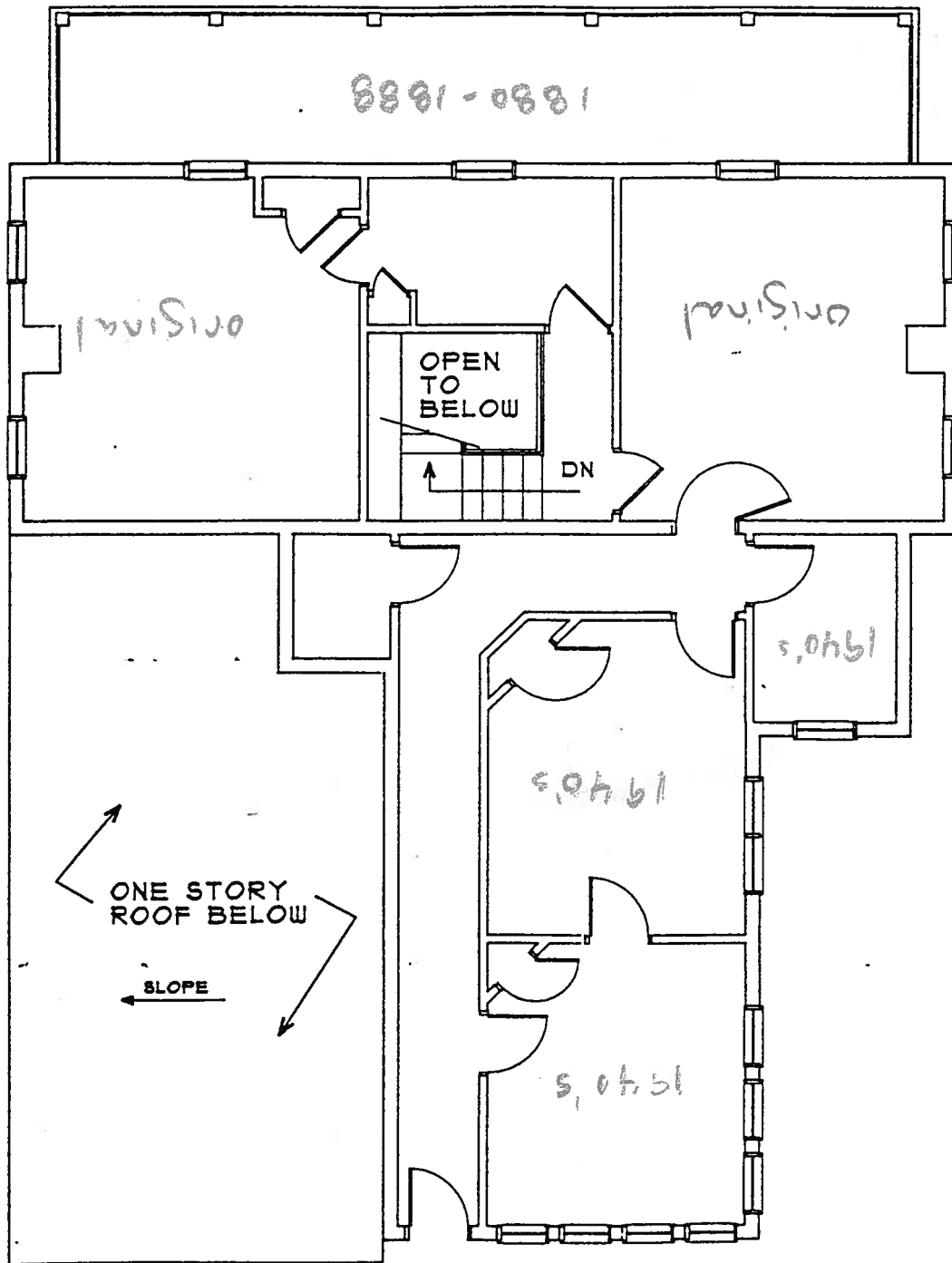

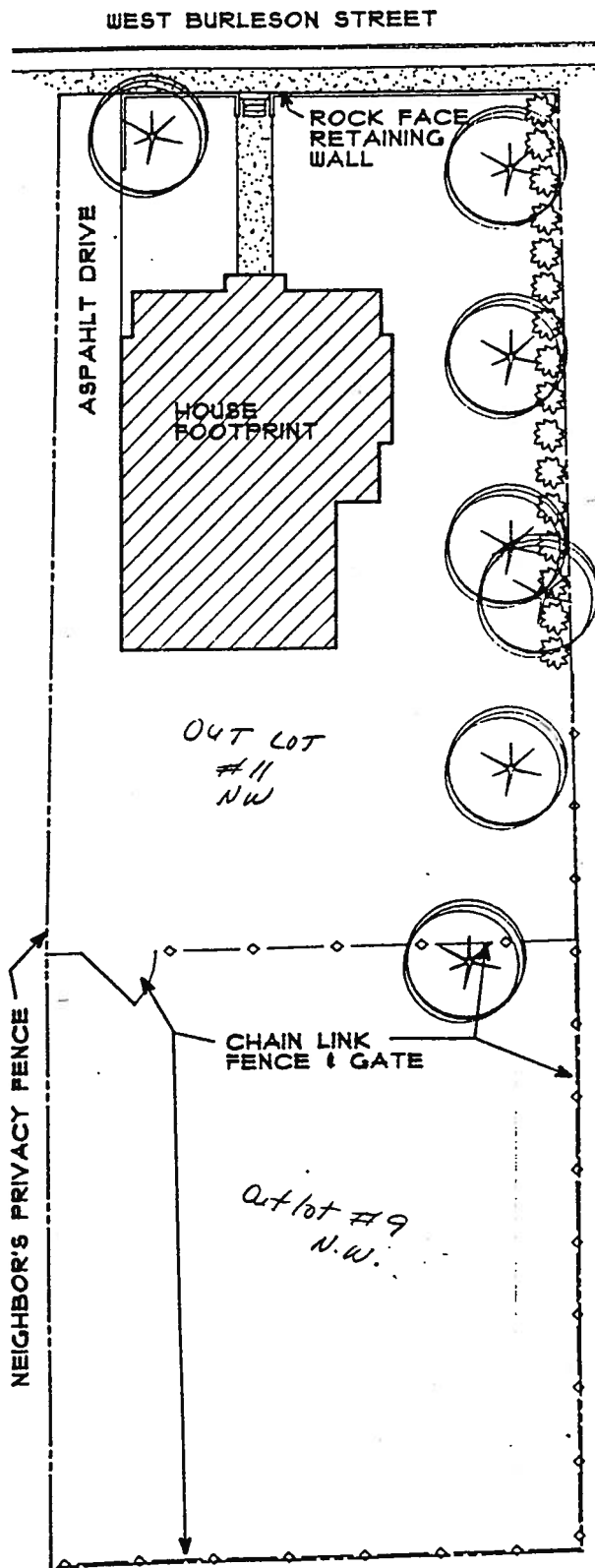

Historical Evaluation: This is a transitional house form; initially built before the Civil War, it was modified ca. 1880s with a Victorian porch and detailing. The three names associated with the history reflect its initial construction (Todd), its association with an important local historical figure (McKay) and its probable Victorian transition (Wheat). Gilchrist McKay is particularly interesting, given his service in the Civil War, during which he was captured at Arkansas Post, imprisoned at Camp Chase (Ohio), and subsequently killed on the battlefield at Mansfield. The history includes good documentation in both the text and the notes on the home's various owners.

Architectural Evaluation: Ca. 1858 vernacular residence. L-shaped plan (also called I-house with projecting ell), 1 room deep, 2 stories tall on main wing and was originally 1 story on the ell. Balloon-frame structure built on pier and beam foundation, clad with clapboard. Gable roof displays box eaves and returns on the gable ends. Primary faces north, divided into 5 symmetrical bays. Defining features include 2-tier full porch with turned wood posts and jigsawn brackets. Balusters at ground level are turned, while balusters on 2nd level are jigsawn. Access to porch is available by pass-through windows. Significant additions were made in 1909, with a 1-story section added to the southwest (adjoining original ell). A ground level was added to the original ell and the 1909 wing in the 1940s.

Dear Margaret:

I have conducted a preliminary review of the application for an Official Texas Historical Marker for the Todd-McKay-Wheat-Brown House. Before I can complete the evaluation, I will need some additional information.

1. Please provide us with clear photographs (snapshots are fine, either black and white or color) of the east and west elevations. The photos should be taken head-on and capture the entire side of the house.
2. We also need a clear, wide angle photograph of the north elevation.
3. Are the windows on the north elevation 4 over 4, double-hung, sash windows? Their exact configuration is obscured by the porch baluster in all the photos we have.
4. Is the roof shingled? If so, is it with wood or composition shingles?
5. You asked for our direction in naming the structure. It would appear that the strongest historical association is with Gilchrist McKay. Changes made by later owners can be noted in the text of the marker without having to include them in the title. It would be proper, as you suggest, to include the Brown name, since they owned the property the longest. So, a suggested title might be the McKay-Brown House. Let us know if that meets with your approval.
6. We need some additional information on the Brown family, particularly about their business or civic activities. When did Oscar and Josie marry? When did she die?

Please note that this is not a rejection of your application, but simply a request for more information. Answers to the above questions should be submitted in the form of a documented addendum to the original application narrative, including reference notes. I will place the application on hold until I hear from you again. In the meantime, please do not hesitate to contact me if you have any questions. Thank you.

Enclosed is the revised edition of the application for an RTHL for the Todd-McKay-Wheat House at 506 West Burleson Street, Marshall, Texas.

I have enclosed new pictures. Clear east and west shots are difficult to take because of fences. I was unable to take a clearer north elevation photo because of the trees. If these are not acceptable, I will try again when the trees are bare.

The windows on the north elevation are all 4 over 4, double-hung sash windows. The porch trim and the shadows make them difficult to photograph clearly. They originally shingled the roof with wood but because of the fire hazard I have shingled the roof with composition shingles.

I have chosen the name Todd-McKay-Wheat for the property: Todd, who built some sizable structure on this site and had historical presence, McKay, who has the strongest historical presence including dying on the Mansfield Battlefield, and Wheat, who made the external Victorian changes including the double porches and gingerbread trim.

Although the Browns owned the property the longest, the Browns only lived here from 1909-1928 when Oscar Brown died. From that date, until they sold it in 1970, the property served as rental property, as determined from local history and from city directories. I did find that Oscar Brown worked for the T&P Railroad but I can find nothing else. The only Brown Family source was very old the last time we spoke and was of little help. She has since died and I cannot find any other family. I therefore suggest that Brown not be listed in the property name.

I have included this information in a revised submission. Only the bibliography, biographical information and the narrative need to be replaced with the revised sections as the other information has not changed.

As always, I am thankful of your assistance in this matter. I look forward your comments and suggestions.

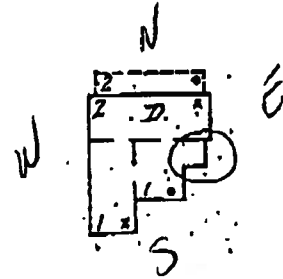

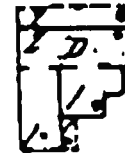
The 1909 Sanborn Fire Map alterations to the original floor plan, but did show the addition of a first story bathroom in the corner formed by the joining of original northeast room and the southeast ell, about one-half the length of the ell and the removal of the southeast ground level porch.

Sanborn Map 1909



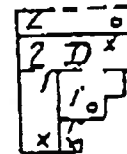
The Sanborn Fire Map done in 1915 showed the addition of small ground level porch in the corner formed by the adjoining southeast two room and southwest one room ells.

With the house still owned by the Brown family, the Sanborn fire Map done in 1931 shows no change from the 1915 Sanborn Fire Map.

Construction methods and materials indicate that the second-story bathroom above the first-story bathroom and the addition of a second-story living space above and the same size as the southeast ell, and a two-story living space equaling the length of the southwest ell were added in the 1940's.

Marshall City Directories note that Oscar F. Brown was an engineer for the T&P Railroad and that the family resided at the house from 1909 until 1926. From 1926 until its sale in 1970 the property was used as rental property. 62 No other community records have been found concerning the Brown Family.

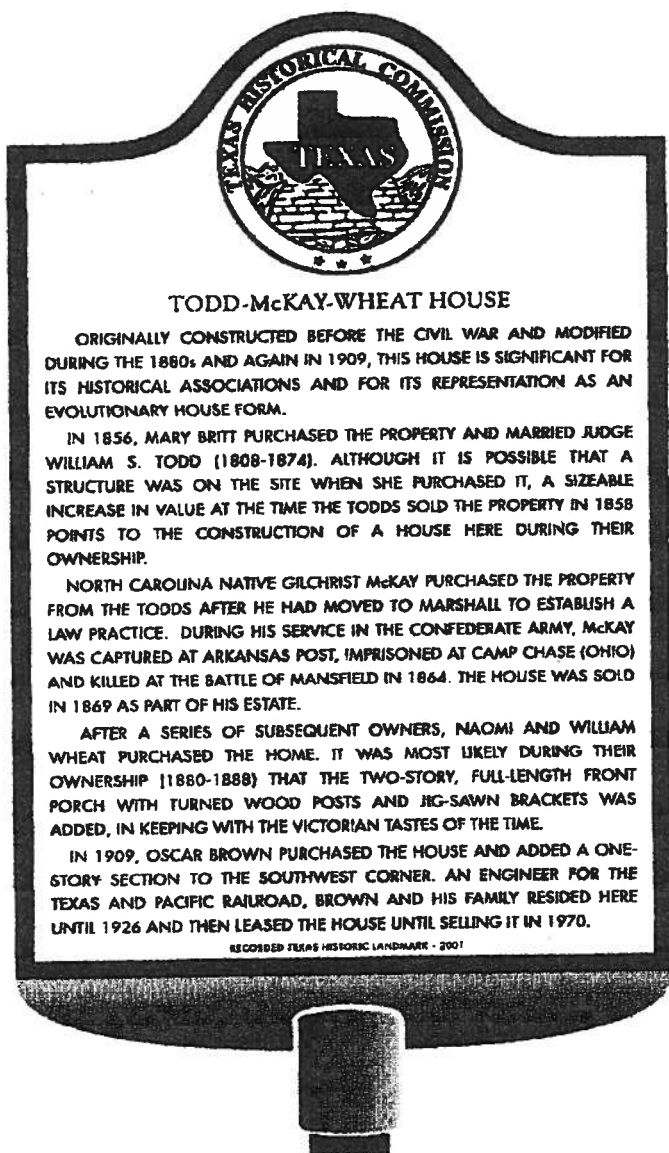

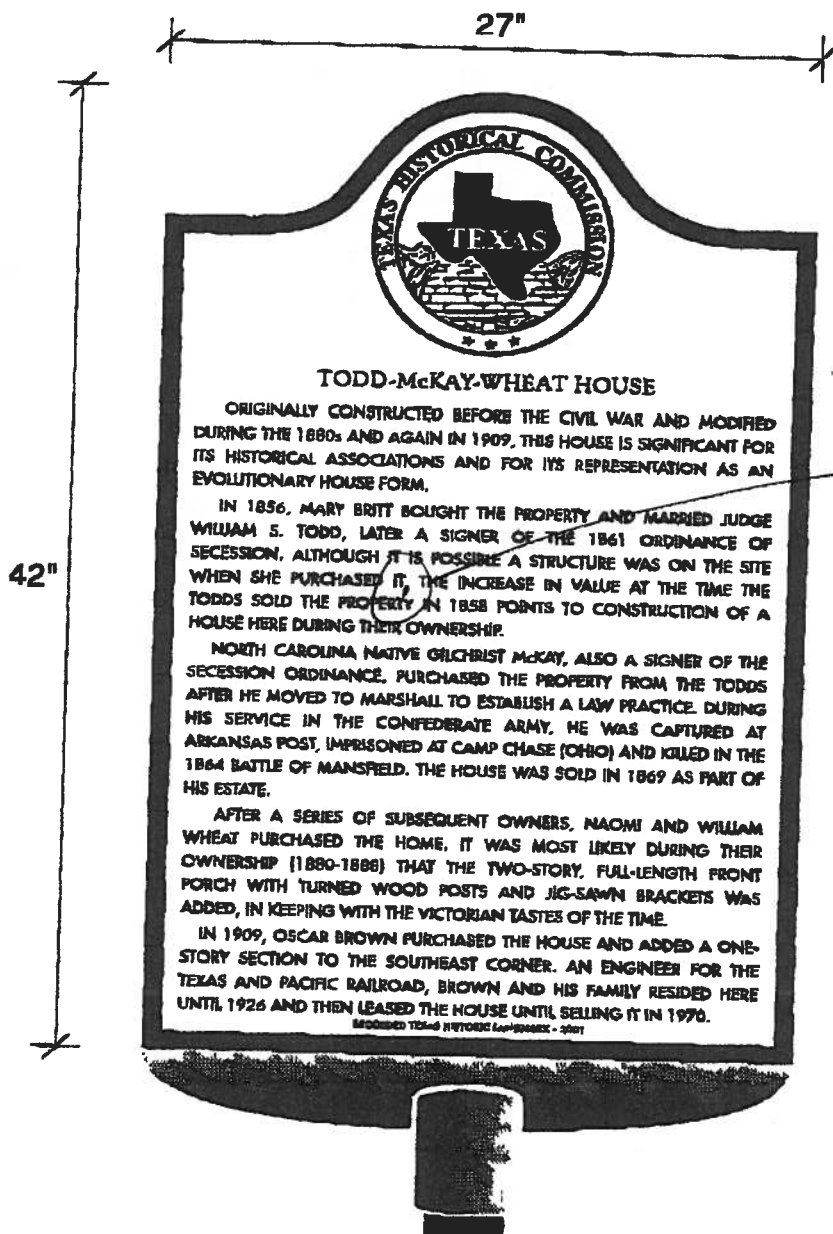

Per your request, enclosed please find light fixture examples we would recommend for your historic house.

The pendant fixture is: Length: 19" - 30", Diameter: 8", wattage: 60. We recommend that this (or similar fixture) be suspended no lower than the center of the transom window located above the front door.

The wall-mounted fixture is: Height: 14", Width: 7", Wattage: 60. We recommend that this (or similar fixture) be mounted in the approx. location as the existing fixtures (adjacent to the rear doors).
