Like many parts of the United States, rural counties in

East Texas and neighboring parishes in Western Louisiana are in the midst of an economic transition. Long
dependent on resource-based extractive industries like
lumbering, oil and gas production, and poultry raising,
communities across the region are discovering that
these traditional modes of income generation no longer
support the populations that they once did. New ways
must be identified to bring economic development to
these areas, ways that allow residents of East Texas
and Western Louisiana to preserve the parts of their
past that they hold dear while adapting to the realities of
a twenty-first-century economy.

Toward that end, the Center for Regional Heritage Research (CRHR) at Stephen F. Austin State University is sponsoring this Heritage Development Summit to encourage region-wide dialogue about best practices in incorporating history into economic development planning.

The Heritage Development Summit was made possible in part with a grant from Humanities Texas, the State affiliate of the National Endowment for the Humanities. Other co-sponsors include the Department of History, the Department of Social and Cultural Analysis, the School of Social Work and the East Texas Historical Association.
